What are we studying? Year 7

Year 7s will soon be moving on to study their class reader, which will either be **Private Peaceful**, **Skellig**, **Cirque du Freak**, **The Switch** or **The Boy in the Striped Pyjamas**.

Year 8

Year 8 are working their way through their Shakespeare unit and will either be studying **Hamlet, Romeo and Juliet or Richard III.**

Year 9

Year 9 groups are continuing their literary studies, with students completing units on Modern Drama or Prose. Texts in these units include **A View from the Bridge**, **Of Mice and Men**, **To Kill a Mockingbird** and **Kindertransport**.

Year 10

English Literature Paper 1 preparation is well under way, with students studying their designated Shakespeare text: **Macbeth** or **Much Ado About Nothing**.

Year 11

Year 11s are now studying their Modern Text for the Paper 2 English Literature exam, which will either be George Orwell's **Animal Farm** or **An Inspector Calls** by J B Priestley. Keep an eye out for any articles or programmes related to these texts and remember that revision guides are available to buy from the English department.


A group of year 7s will be going to see '*The Grinch: The Musical'* on December 18th, so they'll be finding out if the Grinch does indeed steal Christmas!




Shortlists and Awards Keep an eye out for the

Reading Recommendations



In this bulletin, **Mr Williams** recommends L P Hartley's **The Go-Between**, which features one of the most famous opening lines in English Literature: "*The past is a foreign country; they do things differently there.*" Mr Williams says "*I'd had a copy of The Go-Between on the shelf for a number of years, but had never got round to reading it. I finally picked it up recently—and I now kick myself that I waited so long.*

It is an engrossing read, as we are told about the events of a fateful summer at the end of the Victorian era by our narrator Leo, who is now in his 60s. He looks back at the time when he was 13 and acted as a 'go-between' for the wealthy, upper-class Marian and the tenant farmer Ted Burgess. Touching and tragic in equal measure, I thoroughly recommend **The Go-Between.**"
