Invariably, in these opening remarks, I speak of my undiluted pride whenever I proof read the contents of this Newsletter prior to it going to print; pride, which, of course, continues throughout the year. There may, inevitably, have been less going on this year in terms of extra-curricular activity, trips etc. but so much has happened, so much to be proud of. I have been more in awe and full of admiration than ever for what the students and my colleagues have achieved once again over the past 12 months. It is quite staggering and I cannot thank them enough for what they have contributed to our community. We really have witnessed the Wellington character and spirit come to the fore, and I hope these things are reflected in this publication.

My colleagues must also be thanked and congratulated for how they have responded to the demands of the past year and, particularly, how they have handled the GCSE and A level gradings process with such professionalism. It has been a most surreal year (a much over-used word but appropriate, I feel, in this context) but, like last year, the messages of support from parents, the photos and videos of our students' work and 'extra-curricular' antics at home during the spring term closure, the way reward badges have continued to be earned and gleefully received by our young people, the camaraderie that has developed amongst the School community and the mutual support for one another demonstrated, as always, by the Wellington staff have all served to keep us going.

We are now gradually returning to a greater degree of 'normality' (although we had to remind ourselves what that looked like), significantly and thankfully so following our return to School after the half-term break on 7th June. I use the term 'normality' but we have learned a lot about ourselves since March 2020, reflected at length and, consequently, how we 'build back' may lead to both some minor tweaks but also some significant changes. Perhaps most notably, will be our enhanced work around wellbeing, anti-racism and gender equality but there are numerous exciting projects in the pipeline. Using tertiary colours, complementary colours and triadic colours they produced these lovely detailed studies of butterfly wings and beetle paintings.




Year 10 Sounds of the Sea


Wish You Were Here!




Using a range of techniques and processes, Year 10 have been keeping a 'Formal Elements' drawing diary - learning all about Line,

Year 12 continue to create wonderful course work again following their own themes.




These pieces explore charcoal and focus on tonal qualities and surface detail.

We have been very excited this year to set up our own 'Wellington Staff Sketchbook Circle'.



Despite the challenges of lockdown, the class remained positive and motivated.








this time, they were set a

Year 11 Business Studies


After a disrupted Year 10, Year 11 Business pupils returned to school with a real determination to succeed.

Remembrance Day 2020


Wednesday 11th November 2020 marked the 102nd anniversary of the Armistice, the end of World War One.



Year 8 Mediterranean Cuisine


Over the last term Year 8 studied all about the Mediterranean diet.

Thank you for all your efforts Year 11 and the best of luck for the future.



STEM



After returning to school from Lockdown, STEM club has started to explore a new set of resources called Engineering in a Pandemic.

Students have already designed innovative solutions to pandemic specific issues such as social distancing and keeping hands clean. We are now looking at bacteria and viruses. Students who attend STEM club will also take part in a remotely led activity morning called Energy Quest. Energy Quest is a curriculum-linked programme for schools which encourages young people to find out all about sustainable energy and learn about associated engineering careers. Energy Quest will help students to unlock their inner engineer as they explore sustainable energy sources. Linked to sustainable energy, students will cover key topics such as conductivity, energy changes and transfer, magnetism and chemical reactions. Students particularly enjoyed making a battery from oranges! Using electrolysis, groups were tasked with making a battery with limited equipment. Everyone achieved amazing results.






I continue to run the South Manchester STEM Hub (SMaSH) in collaboration with the Royal Academy of Engineering as a Teacher Coordinator. The main objectives of these events are to provide high quality CPD to teachers that already deliver or who would like to deliver STEM in their school. 

Students of 7T and 7N have been reading 'The Bone Sparrow' by the Australian



The book is described as 'captivating and powerful' yet 'disturbing, necessary and important' as it enlightens pupils about the struggles of a Rohingya, Burmese refugee called Subhi, who was born in an Australian detention centre after his mother fled violence in her homeland. Physically, Subhi's world is confined by the fences of the detention centre in which he lives, but through stories, relationships and encounters, a wider but not always comfortable world emerges.

The Bone Sparrow is a timely novel that deals directly with questions about migration, human rights and our broader humanity. It is a highly relevant text and has provided a platform for dialogue around key world issues while building on literature and language studies.

The students have completed a range of tasks in relation to this text including diary entries, description writing, character studies, language analysis and exploring the context and empathy of the text.

I am delighted to have introduced this novel to Year 7 and we have had some really interesting discussions about the treatment and desperation of refugees around the world.

Year 8 (class 8N) have worked incredibly well this term as they have started a new and highly anticipated topic: Romanticism.


Pupils have learnt about the ideology behind the movement and have discussed our relationship with nature and how this can be impacted.


As part of the 'Our Society' unit, 8R used description to empathise with important current events and used persuasive language to write about something in their society which they wanted to change.








During lockdown, 10Y2 produced their own project work on Macbeth.

Despite the turbulent year, they've been super positive and taken






by the sophisticated level of debate, with students able to articulate their points coherently, passionately, and with a level of mutual respect that is often missing in the House of Commons.

Holocaust Memorial Day 2021

It has become an annual tradition for Year 9 Historians to mark Holocaust Memorial Day every January by listening to a Holocaust survivor's testimony.

These events are so valuable for all who take part and we've been fortunate to have had some memorable visits from Joanna Millen, Tomi Komoly and Lady Milena Grenfell-Baines. We didn't want Year 9 pupils to miss out this year so the History Department were delighted when the Holocaust Educational Trust announced that this year they would broadcast a survivor's testimony digitally.

On Tuesday 26th January, all Year 9 pupils were invited to hear the testimony of Eve Kugler BEM. Eve was born in Halle, Germany in 1931. She witnessed the events of Kristallnacht in November 1939, after which her father was sent to Buchenwald Concentration Camp. In June 1939, the family fled to Paris on a forged visa. After living in the occupied city, by chance, Eve and one of her sisters were able to find refuge in New York. Eve's other sister went into hiding and her parents survived the concentration camps. The family was reunited in New York in 1946. Eve worked as a journalist until she moved to London in 1990.

Eve spoke about her heartache at missing her family after leaving Europe. The resilience Eve's family showed to rebuild their lives again in the USA after having lived through the period of Nazi occupation was an inspiration for all listening. Eve's testimony contained so many important messages about tolerance, respect for individuals and appreciation for all we have. Year 9 were very thankful that Eve took time out to speak to them and we hope to host a Holocaust survivor at Wellington again sometime in the future.



Marvellous Micro World

Year 10 and 12 scientists have been examining the world beyond the limit of our vision, looking into both microorganisms and subcellular structures.

Year 10 have been investigating microorganisms, firstly by looking at what types of organisms commonly grow on our own skin as part of the healthy natural skin fauna, 10Y5 have grown these examples on nutrient agar showing different bacterial colonies and one fungus. 10X1 have been investigating how antibiotics work in helping our bodies fight off bacterial infections. They tested the action of four antibiotics: Penicillin;

Tetracycline; Vancomycin and Metronidazole on the bacterium Bacillus megaterium. William Brazendale showed excellent aseptic technique to produce this superb plate showing the zones where the antibiotic has inhibited bacterial growth.

Year 12 have been investigating the stages of mitosis in onion root tip cells as part of their A-Level CPAC assessments and have produced these excellent images showing cells with chromosomes in various stages of mitosis. Eren Sayan, inspired by the work with microscopes, produced these slides on which he managed to make an imprint of a snowflake before it melted. He then brought them into school to use the image capturing equipment in the Science department to create these brilliant images.

snakes, elephant's toothpaste, fire extinguishers, parachutes, bath bombs and even acted like spacemen trying to carry out various tasks with big space gloves on! It is so lovely to see our explorers coming in every week and enjoying themselves. We look forward to doing lots more for the final summer term.





STEM Club – Design your own respiratory device!

Our STEM club attendees this year have been busy exploring all things to do with 'Engineering in a Pandemic'.

The most recent challenge has been to design and make a model for a device to test levels of airflow through different materials. The challenge is inspired by the huge increase in demand this last year to stop the movement of particles between people (for example, by wearing masks) but also to purify air for the wearers through the use of filters. The Year 7s have experimented with different ways to mount the fans and design different wind tunnels, with some great original ideas. We've even had the pleasure of using the 3D printer to replicate more propellers for use in more trials!



Once restrictions allowed, we were able to offer a greater range of activities including sport, Tech Buddies and community work.

In what has become an annual event, we organised and ran a foodbank for the Trussell Trust in December. The students were organised and thorough in their planning and overseeing of the collection. As

always, the generosity of our Wellington community amazed us and we had a van full of goods to





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contribute. Huge thanks to Mr Woolley from our site staff who helped with the delivery and all of the parents and students who donated.

Following our messages of positivity on the school's Reception windows during the pandemic, we organised a Creative Team from 6th Form to create Christmas windows in the main entrance to school. They were a beautiful festive message to everyone in these difficult times; we hope our school community, neighbours, visitors and parents all enjoyed viewing them from Wellington Road. Adding to the Christmas spirit, we also had our annual 'Do your bit in a festive knit' Christmas Jumper Day. Students donned their vuletide best and donated to FareShare, the charity championed by England and Manchester United footballer, Marcus Rashford who is one







of the charity's ambassadors. Our bucket collection raised £220 for this worthy cause.



More Curriculum Enrichment work also included writing and sending Christmas cards to our local residential care homes. A team of our students wrote messages and kind thoughts to those who were on their own or isolated for the festive season. We were delighted so many of our students participated in this venture and were keen to hand deliver the cards themselves.

Another creative project, as part of our Curriculum Enrichment programme, has been stone painting sessions led by Mrs Cook. Again, this was an initiative designed

to benefit our local community. Students designed and painted brightly coloured stones with positive messages and then dotted them around our



We rounded off the term by issuing our 'Passports to Success' to Year 11 who were applying to our 6th Form. It allowed them to reflect on their skills, strengths and successes and form

a basis for their application and subsequent interview. Prospective applicants enjoyed a tour of the facilities and a talk from Mrs Stephens and Mr Cropper about the support and structure we offer, as well as the subject and pastoral content. It certainly sounded like the place to be and this was confirmed by record numbers of students applying to join us next academic year.



As we hit January, it was of course back to another lockdown for everyone. Our students, as ever, showed resilience and determination to access their lessons on

Teams. It was a steep learning curve for all, including staff, but we soon had it sussed! We had to do things a bit differently so we organised a 6th Form tutor programme that focussed on life skills, well-being and health. We launched the 2021 miles challenge, with students recording their weekly mileage. The 2021 miles were soon completed and then some! There

was a healthy eating activity, with students and staff sharing recipes and photographs of the culinary delights they'd made for their families. Move over Gordon Ramsay & Nigella Lawson! We also had a '100 books' challenge with lots of reading recommendations from a variety of genres. Challenge updates were shared via our daily online tutor sessions and we were

delighted by the way in which the students embraced these activities

and sent in their contributions. Mrs Moorhouse and a few of the other tutors added their own flair to tutor time with Fridays being fancy dress!





Teams was the way forward for our Year 11 6th Form interviews, with Mrs Stephens, Mr Cropper and Miss Grey undertaking these. We were super impressed with the students' efforts: they were well prepared, used their passports effectively and spoke really well about their ambitions and future plans. Can't wait to meet them all next year.

Care packages were the order of the day in February. Tutors nominated tutees they felt had gone the extra mile, worked hard and contributed throughout lockdown. A movie night 'snack pack' was put together and Mrs Stephens, Mrs Wilson and Miss Grey became Wellington 6th Form's version of Deliveroo on our quest to drop



off the bags to all the worthy recipients!

Back in school again and our focus was to settle our students following the upheaval they had endured and provide a safe and welcoming learning environment. There were Easter school sessions kindly run by subject staff. Year 13 had offers from universities flying in and decisions about first and insurance choices and accommodation then had to be made. Several of our students have gone down the apprenticeship route with Darcy joining Marks and Spencer and Emily joining Mott McDonald; others have opted for a gap year. Year 12 have now begun their UCAS journey, attending online events to explore the variety of institutions and the wealth of courses on offer. Mrs Wilson has also launched the EPQ with Year 12 and they're currently researching and formulating their project titles.

There are many other opportunities and plans still to come as this term progresses, but we think you will agree that, despite the shadow of Covid and remote learning preventing attendance in school for a number of weeks of the year, it has been really busy and we have achieved a huge amount.

Despite the chaotic Covid and the loopy lockdown, students within Key Stage 3 at Wellington School have smashed this year.

Attendance and engagement during lockdown was fantastic and tutors reported how great it was to chat to the students over that period. As you are aware we have a system of rewarding students within the school using their ClassCharts points and the ratio of positive to negative within those points.

We award badges based on their achievements throughout the year and give postcards out each week for the top performing students within one of our school values.

Although Covid has put paid to our usual "Breakfast with the Boss", "Afternoon Pizza and Film" and termly "Trafford Centre visits", the badges have been important in keeping motivation levels high (these rewards will be back).

We are operating within Key Stage 3 at a 96% positive behaviour ratio for the year so far, which is absolutely outstanding. The culture of rewarding success within the Key Stage has really been embraced by the students. It was so lovely to get out during lockdown and deliver the gold badges to students personally and see how they were getting on (some of you may have seen our highlight reels on our Instagram page). It was also nice to see students receiving their bronze and silver badges through the post and posting their thanks on the Instagram page.

Across the Key Stage 89% of students within the whole of the Key Stage have now achieved their bronze badge, with 73% of pupils having achieved their Silver Badge and 30% of pupils having already surpassed the Gold Badge threshold. Students have even started to achieve our Ambassador status, where they become Ambassadors for our school for various events and tasks. So far 4 Year 7 students, 5 Year 8 students and 3 Year 9 students have achieved their Ambassador badge.









Year 10

Well this will not be a year that anyone forgets. It only seems like yesterday when I first spoke to 241 of the most inspirational and dedicated young people.

Even with the worst global event in their lifetime happening, each and every one has not ceased to amaze and surprise me. The resilience shown and ability to adapt in such a short time frame demonstrated maturity beyond their years and skills that will assist them in future life.

With school being so different, over the last 12 months in particular, you could be excused in thinking the pupils have not had the same opportunity to achieve success. In essence, they have not. What many have done however is turned this negative into a positive and focussed their efforts into their studies and school. As it currently stands, we still have over 70 pupils with zero negatives since September. As well as this, we now have over 120 pupils who have accumulated over 150 positive referrals. Both of these achievements are fantastic but are highlighted even more within the current climate. We are still waiting for our next delivery of KS4 badges then we can celebrate the success of the young people even further. However, at Easter, we had the pleasure of handing out more KS4 badges to our fantastic year group. This reward system builds on the foundations of KS3, and the parameters as follows:

- Gold- over 150 positives with 90% ratio
- Silver- over 100 positives with 85% ratio
- Bronze- over 50 positives with 80% ratio

All levels are a great achievement and as such Mr Manifould and I try to celebrate the success whenever we can. This said, attaining the gold badge, especially within Year 10, is a massive achievement, therefore, Mr Beeley and Mrs Copeland assisted with the presentation.

With Year 11 fast approaching the pupils have been working diligently in class and morning registration time has been dedicated to support their revision. The pupils have been working through revision techniques and have lessons focussed on 'how to revise'. Hopefully these building blocks will assist the excellent foundation many have already

As well as the academic success, we have rallied together and raised money for young children less fortunate than ourselves. As the sponsored walk did not go ahead as normal, we have done this with such creativity and drive this year. Examples included laps around gardens in homage to Captain Tom.

To reward all the amazing things going on daily within the year group we have endeavoured to celebrate with pupils every week, handed out badges each term, sent letters home, positive phone calls home, Christmas selection boxes, tutee of the week and tins of chocolates for quiz winners.

We are both very proud of our year group and the culture we are trying to create.

Stay Connected

During the school closures, the SEND department continued to attend school to support our most vulnerable through the 'Stay Connected' provision. This allowed students with SEN to continue to have routine and access specialised support.

The provision proved a success and this continued once we returned to some normality to help students transition back into school.

Interventions

We have strengthened our intervention team this year with the appointment of Ms Tomlinson who has a primary teaching background and Mrs Warren who is a Maths and Science specialist. They are working with a wide variety of students to support their learning in and outside of the classroom.

This adds to the current intervention team which includes Mrs Soldiew (SPLD and EAL) and Mrs Potter (Behaviour/ SEMH).

We are excited to be starting our new literacy skills focus group, aimed at supporting Year 7 with confidence and new skills to improve their writing. It has been lovely to see the enthusiasm and creativity already from the pupils during these sessions. We have been looking at sentence types, punctuation and how to 'stretch' a sentence to add detail. The students are enjoying working together and sharing ideas, we even made a human sentence by standing up and joining parts of a sentence together!

SEND

Within the school our children with Special Educational Needs have had many exciting opportunities. As we strive to be an inclusive school most of the opportunities are encompassed within the whole school learning environment. However please see below some of the exciting things we have been doing as a department.

The Hub

We are delighted that the Hub has seen the introduction of TEAMS to help students stay connected with their teaching members of staff.

This has strengthened the HUB offer for children who are struggling to access a mainstream education.

Breakfast/ Homework Club

We have managed to get breakfast club and homework club back to some normality. Students attend the clubs if they are struggling to complete their homework independently or if they need to engage in some social communication intervention in the mornings.

The children are greeted by the very enthusiastic TA team in the morning and the evening. This provision is extremely beneficial to our students and without the commitment of the TAs we would not be able to offer this wonderful provision.

Reading Groups

The Teaching Assistants have been working hard to help children develop a love for reading within the reading groups.

Each TA has a group of students who attend 2x weekly sessions to develop their reading accuracy and reading comprehension. The children enjoy their sessions but I am sure that the juice and biscuits help with their engagement!





Estates

It has been another busy year in the Estates department with lots going on, a number of projects staff and students have seen the improvement straight away, others have not been so obvious.

Starting off with the completion of the partial roof replacement. From September to December, Everlast Group finished off the Sports Hall roof and for those of you with a keen eye you will notice the slight shade difference on the colouring. The final phase of the roofing project was the Adshead Hall and Gym where they renewed the roofing materials, taking the old stone off and fitting new roof panels to create improved drainage and insulation.

Over the Christmas holidays, a team from Audience Systems installed our new retractable seating into the Adshead Hall. This was planned to improve the versatility of this space, allowing for raised auditorium seating to be used for both conference and performances, ensuring uninterrupted views for every member of the audience.

As well as the seating, during our Christmas holidays, we had 414 Solutions developing our new Student Support Office/Reception allowing for a more personal experience for our students when they are needing additional support.

In January, we set up our COVID Testing Centre after receiving our pallets of equipment from the Government. The Adshead Hall was split up into three different sections, as per Government guidance, with a welcome and registration area first, then into a testing bay with a warm welcome by one of our volunteers, a member of Senior Leadership Team or one of our Pastoral Managers, who had all been fully trained to conduct the testing.

Then for the final stage of the process, our Admin staff logged all the results, with Mr Beeley and I overseeing every stage to up hold our quality control process. It was an accomplishment to test all our students three times in a two-and half-week period upon their return to school, and without our volunteers and the help of our staff (a special thank you to Dr Lane our Senior Science Technician) we could not have done this.

Over the Easter holidays the team were busy again with contractors finishing off the Adshead Hall project. Adlib Audio installed a new digital lighting and sound system to enhance our future performances and conferences, with all new LED performance lighting and digital sound allowing for easier and quicker set up times as well as reducing our carbon footprint. With this installed, it completed our project along with newly installed seating system.

As part of the continuation to refurbish our facilities, the MFL classrooms have had replacement carpet planks installed by Flooring Solutions over the Easter break with a new look to freshen up the current worn out carpets before they become a trip hazard.

All this has taken place alongside the normal day to day running and general maintenance of the Estate, and credit must also be given to Mr Rogerson and our cleaning staff who have embraced the enhanced cleaning needs that the school has had to deal with over this last year.
