



What is Independent Study?



- Timetabled periods during the course of the week where your son/daughter will utilise the private study facilities available.
- These are separate from the free periods given which can be spent in the common room.
- These periods are a chance for your son/daughter to further their understanding of their chosen subjects by carrying out some Independent Work.
- Students are expected to adopt a <u>focused and</u> <u>dedicated</u> approach to their private study periods.



Why is Independent Study so important?



- To prepare your son/daughter for university/further education.
- To help access the <u>higher grades</u> at A level- without effective I.S this is not possible.
- To further your sons/daughters interest in the subjects that they have chosen to study.
- To help your son/daughter enjoy the lessons that they attend
- To embed deep understanding—especially important with the introduction of linear courses.





Expectations

- Students are expected to indicate on their timetable which private study session they are dedicating to each subject. This will ensure that all subjects are given equal attention.
- Private study time is not for completing homework— this is to be done after School hours.
- It is crucial that your son/daughter has a <u>separate section in each subject</u> <u>folder</u> for their Independent Study Work.

How will Independent Study be given/marked?



- At the start of each half term teachers will give your son/daughter a <u>list of</u> <u>compulsory and optional tasks</u> that they can complete during their private study for each subject
- Every half term students will be required to complete the compulsory task set and a minimum of one activity from a list of optional tasks.
- At the end of each half term progress with Independent tasks will be reviewed by members of staff and any necessary feedback will be given.

How do we know what grade your son/daughter is working at?

- We begin by using a Nationally recognised predictor based on students' GCSE Results.
- This is converted into a TARGET grade which gives each teacher the grade your son/daughter should be working towards in each subject.
- Teachers will use their assessments and exam scores to determine how well you son/daughter is working.
 Every subject has in place an assessment system to determine progress and intervene early if they have concerns.
- Students will complete five internal assessments each year. They will be given a grade achieved after each assessment. This will be compared against the target grade to determine progress. Intervention will be made if students do not meet expected progress. The student will receive an Assessment Feedback Form (a copy will be sent to parents too!)




