### 1. School Council Objectives

Isabelle Goto (Year 12) spoke passionately to the group about her time in School Council which stretched back to Year 7. She explained the idea behind the School Council for the benefit of our new Year 7 and Year 8 attendees – unfortunately, COVID has meant that Year 8s were unable to attend a full SC meeting last year.

As far as possible the agenda for meetings should be set by the pupils. It is expected that staff should play nothing more than a supporting role and that it is the pupils who should be proactive in leading change and driving improvement at Wellington School. The Council has a fabulous opportunity to influence the way in which school works and all pupils should be certain that their voice and opinions will be listened to.

Isabelle explained that the School Council is a forum for improvement and she highlighted many visible examples of things the School Council has achieved and campaigned for in recent years. These included tangible changes to the school site such as picnic benches and covered areas, as well as the chance to influence school culture by citing the school values and discussions with the kitchen staff over menu choices at lunchtimes. Isabelle spoke with particular passion about the removal of single-use plastics in school and mentioned the Eco-Council, of which she is also a member. Isabelle also explained that the School Council become involved in wider political campaigns and organise the annual Make Your Mark vote and attend the Trafford Youth Cabinet conference annually.

#### 2. Student Voice at Wellington

The message that students at Wellington are listened to and are able to affect change was demonstrated with the following presentations:

- The Halo Hair Code has been adopted by Wellington and a presentation by Stephanos and Esme (Year 8) was shared with students to explain the historical and cultural issues associated with Black and Afro-Caribbean hair. Our adoption of the Halo Code is an illustration that our value of Fairness means NOT treating everyone the same. A similar presentation will be shared in ALL tutor groups later this week.
- The Gender Equality Council were represented by Jessica, Jessica and Isobel (Year 10) who outlined their campaign to get all members of the school community to use appropriate language and behave in an acceptable manner towards all represented groups at Wellington. They clarified language and definitions around gender identity and explained where they held their meetings.

- Organisation
- Commitment and loyalty
- Communication

Letters of application should be with Mr Holt by Friday 15<sup>th</sup> October.
