- Support your child with reading for purpose. You could read recipes, newspaper articles, blog posts and other forms of texts.

Whatever you and your child choose to read, we hope you enjoy it!



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Your Mind Matters: Beating Stress and Anxiety





MATTHEW BURTON



in an illegal garment factory.




Needle PATRICE LAWRENCE (13+)

criminal justice system, Charlene's not sorry and she's never apologised to anyone. But people keep telling her that if she says sorry, they'll go easier on her...


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The Starlight Watchmaker



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Sadé and Her Shadow Beasts






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Beyond the Frozen Horizon

RACHEL BURGE (14+)






mother tongue might be deadly, and where even the people she loves the most can't be trusted?

memorable monster of them all: Frankenstein

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


SHERMAN ALEXIE (12+)

Social Media Survival Guide HOLLY BATHIE




Phil Earle Recommends...






Darren Simpson Recommends...




