

Welcome to our latest Wellington School Newsletter



Prior to writing this year's Newsletter introduction, I had a quick glance back at what I had to

say last year; inevitably, there were references to 'the Omicron variant', 'ramifications of the pandemic', lots of the 'first time in three years' events etc. I think it's fair to say that the impact of Covid is still significant for many on an individual, community and wider societal level but at Wellington we have adjusted pretty well to the 'new normal' and there is a joyous abundance of evidence of that in this bumper edition of the Newsletter!

Rather than a global pandemic, it has been the more localised disruption of water mains bursting, industrial action and the passing and subsequent coronation of monarchs that have impacted our school calendar; nothing we can't handle with true aplomb, grace and resilience. As you read this Newsletter I hope that, once again, you sense the unbridled joy, the enthusiasm, the commitment and the pride that, in my humble opinion, is so typical of the Wellington community. It is quite staggering what we have achieved this year and I cannot thank everyone enough for what they have contributed.

I must make special mention of this year's sponsored walk and our chosen charity Papyrus. Based in Warrington but providing support nationally, Papyrus is committed to suicide prevention for young people. The assemblies, arranged by new sponsored walk coordinator-in-chief, Mrs Stephens, were emotional enough but we were then joined on the day by one of the '3 dads walking', Mike Palmer, who tragically lost his daughter Beth to suicide. Only this week, Mike and the other dads met Secretary of State for Education, Gillian Keegan, to discuss the place of suicide prevention work in schools. Suffice to say, sponsored walk day was a resounding success as always and due to the efforts of our young people, the generosity of their friends and families and the support of colleagues, we raised over £30,000 once again. Thanks and well done to Mr Fenwick, the 'machine' that is our Deputy Headteacher, who completed the coast-to-coast 300km race in 61 hours, finishing 12th and raising over a £1000 split between Papyrus and the Warrington Foodbank. Thank you also to the aforementioned Mrs Stephens who did a brilliant job in coordinating the build-up, the day itself and the collection of monies. Our relationship with Papyrus will be ongoing as we seek to best meet the needs of all our young people.

There have been so many highlights again this year but among them I must include the performance of 'Matilda', our biggest and best ever Bronze Duke of Edinburgh expedition (over 170 Year 95 split over two weekends), our first ever Chinese / Lunar New Year celebration, the Year 7 boys' football team becoming the first Wellington team to win the Greater Manchester cup, our Eid celebration and, possibly my number 1, the visit of Holocaust survivor, 95 year old Ike Alterman and the subsequent renaming of the Gloucester building in his honour. But, of course, that doesn't even scratch the surface of all that our students and staff have accomplished this year.

It would be remiss of me not to mention our Year 11 and 13 students, who, as I type, have just begun week 2 of 5 weeks of GCSE and A level examinations. The Year 13s, of course, never got to sit their GCSEs and they, and their younger counterparts, have had their studies disrupted over the subsequent two years. They have inevitably shown that true Wellington grit and character and we are confident that they will meet their own high expectations come results' days. I must also commend my colleagues for managing these students (academically and emotionally) with such care and dedication through this challenging period.

The last year has seen several additions to the Wellington 'family'; congratulations to Miss Pusey, Dr McMahon, Miss Challinor, Miss Tyrer, Mr Scott, Mrs Richardson, Mr Brownbill and, of course, their partners. We welcomed back Miss Pusey from her maternity leave in the April and we look forward to welcoming back Mrs Richardson, Dr McMahon, Miss Challinor and Miss Tyrer at the end of the Summer term.

At this point, I always like to acknowledge our outgoing and incoming colleagues. Last summer we said goodbye to Mrs Mildenstein, Mr Lloyd and Mrs Copeland and during the course of this year Mrs Baxter (Exams), Miss Flett (Science Technician), Miss Lee (Music), Mr Hatchell (Pastoral Manager), Mrs Shield (Finance) and Mrs Rushby (Social Sciences). We hope they are all well and continuing to do great things in their new roles or relishing the joys of retirement.

I often reflect that we must be doing something right here at Wellington as we have very little turnover of staff but we have added to the team this year in a number of areas, so a belated welcome and thank you for your efforts so far to: Dr Moussallati (Science Technician), Mrs Shields (Exams), Mrs Bailey (Finance), Miss Waldie (Student Support), Mr Garstang (Site Team), Mrs McCallin (TA), Ms Malpass (TA), Ms McNamee (TA), Mrs Parkinson (TA) and Miss Scholes (TA) . We hope they will all have happy and successful careers here at Wellington, however long they may be with us for.

Anyway, that's quite enough from me, enjoy the Newsletter, thank you to all our Wellington 'family' and have a great summer.

Year 7 - Formal Elements


The work got off to a 'flying' start with the exploration of insects across a broad range of different materials.


From oil pastel to ink, different qualities were experimented with and the fundamentals of Art like tone, texture, mark making, colour and pattern explored.






Art Support

The department has been busy this year offering a range of enrichment opportunities for our GCSE students.

Year 10 Enterprise and Marketing

Our current Year 10's are working towards the OCR Cambridge National in Enterprise and Marketing and have made a fantastic start to the course.

They have had the opportunity to visit Old Trafford as well as visiting the Trafford Centre to complete their market research activities this year.

The visit to Old Trafford was an opportunity for pupils to see a football club from a different perspective. Our first activity was to take part in a workshop, delivered by one of Manchester United Youth Team coaches, focusing on marketing and the importance of branding. Pupils fully engaged with the discussion and



showed a good understanding of the impact social media has on consumers as well as the value of having a strong brand and reputation. This was followed up by a guided tour of the stadium.

Although no sign of Rashford, pupils had the opportunity to have their photo taken with a range of famous memorabilia, including Beckham's shirt and Ronaldo's boots.

Year 10 GCSE Business Studies

We have re-introduced GCSE Business Studies this year and it has proven to be extremely popular with our KS4 students. As part of their studies our Year 10 pupils visited Cadbury World.

The visit was an opportunity for pupils to see a business in action and bring classroom content to life. After a selfguided tour about the manufacturing

process of chocolate, during which the pupils had the opportunity to temper chocolate and observe staff personalising a range of Christmas products, the pupils participated in a talk. The talk covered a range of current topics from product design and branding, to costs and the environmental impact. Pupils engaged in the talk showing an understanding of the content. They have been able to use this learning in lessons since our visit.

Year 10 Enterprise Challenge

Run by Manchester Airport, the department entered a team to take part in a Dragon's Den style Enterprise Challenge - to create and sell a Christmas gift to raise money for a local charity.

Our team, Team Vixen, created a fantastic children's Christmas activity kit and had to pitch their idea to the dragons to win the investment.

Having successfully secured the investment, the hard work really began – creating and selling their kits. The team identified a number of sales opportunities including attending Christmas parties at local care homes and Christmas fairs held at primary schools.

The final task was to deliver a presentation in front of the dragons. Sitting in the presentation, I was proud of how they presented themselves and of their achievement to complete this challenge. They raised a fantastic £250 for Francis House.

All of the class demonstrated excellent presentation skills and conveyed their ideas with confidence. Business Studies London Trip

In January the Business Studies cohort visited London as part of the department's enrichment programme.

The highlight of the first day was a visit to the Museum of Brands to investigate the importance of brand image and packaging. Pupils

took a journey through the history of branding, before redesigning the packaging for a number of well known brands. To finish a very busy day, the group visited the London Eye before taking in Leicester Square at night.





During the second day the pupils developed their understanding of the role of the Financial District in UK economy and took in key locations of the City of London during a guided walking tour. The group also visited the home of Chelsea Football Club to learn more about the business of football and gained valuable insight into the inner workings of one of Europe's most successful clubs.

On the final day the pupils got to learn more about the UK economy with a tour of the Bank of England. Before heading home, we also got to see London from above, taking a very cold and windy trip to the 72nd floor of the highest building in the UK, the Shard.



To finish off the Spring term the group attended

the Tutor2U Grade Booster workshop in Manchester. The workshop provided an interactive, intensive and engaging learning environment where the pupils worked hard to further develop their exam technique and understanding of the key theory studied so far. We are looking forward to further enrichment activities in the summer term including employer talks from representatives from the Finance industry.

Bebras and OUCC

Every November, all Computing students at Wellington take part in the Bebras Challenge, which tests them on their computational and logical thinking skills.

Those that score in the top 10% in the country receive a gold award and qualify for a further competition – the Oxford University Computing Challenge. 44 of our students qualified (some are pictured here).

The highest scorers in Key Stage 3 were Rachel Miles (Year 9), Jimi Nicholls (Year 8) and Archie Taylor (Year 7).

The OUCC tests the ability to create programmed solutions to computational thinking problems and goes far beyond the normal curriculum for their age group. We had our best ever results this year. Two of our students scored in the top 5% nationally and narrowly missed out on a place in the final at Oxford. One of those is Lewis Goodwin who is pictured here with his certificate of distinction.

Cybergirls First Trip to UA92

KS₃ - Year 8

Mediterranean Cuisine

Within the Mediterranean area there are a wide variety of countries and cultures, each with their own unique style of delicious Mediterranean Cuisine.

As such it is a perfect area to study and with many people holidaying in this region many pupils are already familiar with some of the dishes.

Year 8 pupils have the opportunity to research the Med and make a number of common dishes before going on to plan their own choice of final dish.

Pupils not only learn about the different dishes and typical types of ingredients used in Mediterranean countries, they also develop a wide range of skills such as using different types of research, organisational skills and time management.

Practical lessons have further developed skills that we started to learn in Year 7 with pupils making Greek Salad (Greece), French style Chicken with Bacon and Peas (France), Pizza (Italy) and Meskouta Orange Cake (Morocco).

The final assessment for all pupils was a practical task. The pupils were required to find a Mediterranean recipe of their own choice, using this to develop a detailed time plan which was followed when making their chosen dish.

I have loved seeing the variety of dishes chosen and it has been particularly pleasing discussing the ideas with pupils, many of whom have really challenged themselves.

Sustainable Toys

Year 8 students have been designing and making sustainable toys made from organic cotton, recycled felt and buttons in Textiles this year.

The toy designs are aimed at young children and are based on 'friendly monsters' and have been created with their own unique and original characters.

Students have experimented with a range of decorative techniques to enhance the fabric using tie dye, hand embroidery to appliqué, and machine sewing skills to manufacture the toy.

As well as developing their practical skills students have also been learning why is organic cotton better for us as consumers and the environment too!

Product Design

Year 8 have continued to develop their Design and Technology workshop skills manufacturing a working clock based on a frame design incorporating 4 wood joints at 90 degree angles to enable precise construction of the clock body.

The students have also designed the face for their clock using Computer Aided Design facilities and vector graphics. I am sure you will agree; the outcomes are fantastic.

Asia, Africa and the Americas

Building on work completed in Year 8 on Mediterranean Cuisine, Year 9 begin looking further afield learning about the types of cuisine served in Asia, Africa and the Americas.

To make this unit even more challenging, pupils must also consider the cost of living increasing across the UK, and investigate ways to manage a budget as well as provide low cost, nutritious family meals.

Theory lessons have not only covered how to analyse a design brief and how to research, but have also included information on healthy eating guidelines and which cooking methods are more beneficial when creating nutritious meals.

Practical dishes we have made include Matar Paneer (India), Bunny Chow (South Africa) and Chinese Chicken Curry (China). Pupils also made an assessed final dish of their own choice.

Detailed time plans are an important aspect of Cooking and Nutrition and pupils start to learn about them in Year 8. Year 9 gives us another opportunity to revisit and further develop skills and knowledge of time plans and once again pupils are expected to complete their own, which must be followed when making their chosen dish.

KS4 - Year 10

Design & Technology

Year 10 Design & Technology students have been developing their investigative, analytical, design and making skills to complete a Design & Make project to prepare them for their Non-Examination Assessment which commences in June.



The project aim is to design a fashion corset for a high-profile event or occasion. Students identified a client and investigated their needs and requirements. They have analysed existing products and designs for inspiration before creating their ideas.


HS2 Event


In January, 60 Year 9 students were given the opportunity to participate in a full day's workshop exploring the new railway system HS2.

Year 7 Drama

What a fun and fantastic start the new Year 7 cohort have made. After learning and developing their umbrella of basic drama skills, the year started off with an exploration into the very spooky Dark Wood Manor. Students explored the background of the house and what made it so famously scary, they became objects and Gargoyles using physical theatre whilst also exploring thought track to express how a character is feeling.

The year then moved on with an exploration into one of the Drama departments favourite authors, Roald Dahl. We started with his famous 'Charlie and the Chocolate Factory', using film clips, character studies and scripts the pupils leapt into the roles of Verruca Salt, Violet Beauregarde, Augustus Gloop and Mike Teevee to explore how to use their voices and body language in character presentation. The exploration of Roald Dahl did not stop there and neither did the



opportunity to learn new skills, James and the Giant Peach, Matilda, Georges Marvellous Medicines and The Twits helped students to explore skills such as physical theatre, conscious alley, ensemble and script work.

From the wonderful world of Roald Dahl to a completely different topic, students became spys! They went undercover to work for a special spy school to find out clues and complete missions around the theatre practitioner Constantine Stanislavski. Students were tasked with exploring naturalism, mime and deeper characterisation with a range of skills such as emotional memories, the art of experience, visualisation and understanding the importance of the fourth wall. This scheme of work really challenged students as it opened their mind up to working with their emotions, motivations behind scenes and the objectives behind each character's thoughts, movement and dialogue choices.

Our final scheme, and one every single student knows I would not miss the opportunity to build in to the curriculum, wave those magical wands, as it's Harry Potter! Continuing our studies on characterisation, students used their characterisation skills to understand how best to represent a character on stage, making them unique, interesting and of course, entertaining for our audience.

This Year 7 cohort have been an absolute pleasure to teach, they have been resilient, hard working and creative. So many different tasks and skills have been thrown at them this year and they have cracked on with every single challenge faced, all whilst making their teacher laugh and most importantly proud! Well done Year 7 a fantastic contribution to lessons and extra-curricular activities.

Year 8 Drama

Their return to Wellington and a fresh new year! Year 8 got well and truly stuck in straight away, exploring Willy Russell's Blood Brothers.

Using a bank of body language skills from Year 7, students explored a range of characters from different social



backgrounds and different ages. They allowed themselves to have fun and let their guards down to be fun and energetic 7-year olds, whilst understanding that adult life can take a quick turn and superstition can change everything! The performances and characters created by the students were fantastic and staff within the department were blown away by many of the performances. Many questionable, funny and fantastic Liverpudlian accents were used as well!

Next, students went on a journey, a journey through the ages, looking at the history of theatre. Firstly, they went straight back to the start and explored choral work/speaking within Greek Theatre, some fantastic creations of mythical creatures and explorations of the story of Oedipus. They also looked at where characterisation and mask work started within Commedia dell'arte and Kabuki, then finishing with the most famous theatre movements Naturalism and Brechtian theatre.

We then looked at a piece of Verbatim theatre, exploring the story of Derek Bentley. 'Let Him Have It'. Students explored the real story and were able to share their thoughts and feelings in the safe space of the drama classroom. They recreated the allimportant scenes from the story using a range of skills, marking the moment being one of these. Students were also able to discuss stereotypes and how we may represent these through our characterisation. Year 8 approached this topic with such maturity and the discussion had demonstrated to us just how thoughtful and understanding this year group are. It's a pleasure to allow such open discussions to happen within the classroom.

Finally, students explored William Shakespeare's 'A Midsummers Night Dream', exploring the different characters/speeches using stage combat and physical theatre. Stage combat was a brandnew skill for our students and they really enjoyed learning how to create these moments on stage, being creative and adding a whole new definition to our performances.

Year 8 have been an absolute pleasure to teach this year and we are so proud of how hard they work and how enthusiastic they are! Their enthusiasm has also been shown through the contribution to extra-curricular and their passion for performing! Well done!

Year 9 Drama

What a great year for our Year 9 cohort. The independent and thought-provoking topics inspired excellent performances on stage.

This year has purposely pushed students out of their comfort zones in creating performances that challenge them and the audience around them.

The year started off with a focus on one of John Godber's most famous plays, 'Teechers'. This topic allows students to explore skills such as, characterisation, physicality and multi-role, all whilst exploring comedy on stage. This script is really relatable for the students and so are the stereotypes that comes with it meaning that the students really engage with what is in front of them! We then took a step back in time, where we visited a Borstal, students played characters from a borstal and learnt how to create a character back story to help with the creation of character. This scheme of work also pushed students out of their comfort zone as they had to perform monologues on stage for the first time.

Students then explored Physical Theatre, in particular Frantic Assembly, they looked at the 'Frantic Method' of building blocks working with, Round-By-Through and Chair Duets. They then took their newly learnt skills and created a performance around the idea of fear and how fear can be portrayed on stage through physicality rather than words. Really impressed with the performances that were created and there was a lot of fun had in each lesson learning a new element of Frantic Assembly!

Finally, students then developed their skills of being able to analyse and evaluate live theatre. Students watched a performance and then looked at understanding why and how different things were used on stage. Such as set, costume, proxemics, music and a whole lot more! This scheme was a nice way of bringing the year to a close as it summed up all the skills the students have explored through KS3, they were able to identify them through watching a live performance, they were then able to write and evaluate these.




Year 11 Future Writers Competitions





Naming of the Alterman Building

Ike is a Holocaust survivor. His Fed My Voice life book, which chronicles his life before, during and after the Second World War and includes detailed recollections of his time as a prisoner of four Concentration Camps, has inspired the History Department to redesign our teaching of the Holocaust around Ike's story. As a result of this, Ike has become part of the Wellington Community and our pupils continue to learn invaluable lessons from his life every year. Ike has made such an impact on our staff and students that we decided to rename the Humanities building after him. Ike, his family and friends from the Jewish Fed were present at School to see Ike proudly unveil the Alterman Building. To quote Ike's speech, 'Never in my wildest dreams did I think the young boy who came to England with no family, having survived the worst of man's cruelty, would be standing here having a building named after him'. Ike is a wonderful man and fully deserves the honour of having a building at Wellington named in his honour. His legacy will live on at Wellington School for many years.

Ike Alterman

On Wednesday 30th November 2022, Ike Alterman gave up his time to speak to Year 10 Historians and 6th Form students.

Ike is a Holocaust Survivor. To a packed Adshead Hall filled with around 140 pupils, the Mayor of Manchester Andy Burnham and Nihal Arthanayake of BBC 5 Live, Ike spoke poignantly about his life before, during and after the Second World War. Ike implored pupils to





remember his story, the family he lost and the 6 million murdered for their faith. His main message was to "Help everybody! Help the person who hasn't got the facilities and education you have! Do it! Don't wait for other people!" It was a lifechanging experience for all present and one of the most inspiring speeches I have ever had the pleasure of hearing in person. We have now integrated lke's story into our History curriculum so our pupils can learn from his experiences in the future. After Ike's talk, two of our Ukrainian pupils, Vlad and Sonia, were interviewed by the BBC along with lke. Thank you to Ike, the Jewish Fed, Mayor Andy Burnham and the BBC for making the day so memorable and special.







This is a project offered by the Holocaust Educational

Trust that enables pupils to learn more about the history of the Jewish people, Antisemitism and indeed, the Holocaust itself. Here is a short synopsis of the visit to Auschwitz that occurred earlier this month from one of the participants, Ava Conyers:

"To say that it was upsetting would be an understatement. I don't think I'll ever experience anything close to how harrowing it was. It exceeded all my expectations and learning about it in school and seeing it in real life, are two very different things. I think when you learn about it and see images of what happened, your brain can't quite comprehend it. You hear statistics of '6 million' people losing their lives and that number is so huge, it takes away the fact that each one of those is a person. You forget that they had a life just like you and I and this experience is important because it gives us a chance to rehumanise those victims. They aren't just faceless numbers and statistics; they are a reminder that we must never forget what happened in places like Auschwitz. Very ordinary people did extraordinarily horrific things. Antisemitism still exists today and there are even some people that deny that the Holocaust ever happened. It is vital that we come together to ensure that acts of discrimination and prejudice like this never happen again."

Ava and Abi have been fantastic ambassadors for the project this year and have helped to share their experiences with other pupils. We hope that we will be able to send more pupils in years to come and continue to help to facilitate a fantastic opportunity for our pupils.


Jewish History Museum



NHS Careers-Pathology and Biomedical Science Workshop

This event was an opportunity to promote the importance of Pathologists in the study of disease, their essential role in diagnosis as well as to highlight the roles of other scientists that they work with such as Biomedical Scientists, Microbiologists and Oncologists.

We were lucky to be able to host a team of professionals that took time away from their dayto day work; Dr James Bolton, Consultant Histopathologist, Mr Chinta Chisambo, Advanced Biomedical Scientist and Ms Sam Holden, National Histopathology Training Manager to come

into Wellington School and deliver a workshop for Year 10 Triple Scientists and Year 12 A Level Biologists.

Students were introduced to the science of cancer which led into a case study of a patient presenting to their GP with tiredness and weight loss. This was followed by looking at the patient's clinical history and then at ways that tissues are collected by various biopsy procedures. Students then followed a carousel of practical activities, one in which they observed real animal organs, and "fixed" organs, as well as observing an expert dissection and demonstration by Dr James Bolton.

In another activity there was an opportunity for students to experience the role of Biomedical Scientist by preparing microscope slides of the biopsy tissue and use advanced staining techniques to make cell structures visible. Students finished by using microscopy to look at slides of the tissues they'd prepared and compare their healthy tissue with images of potentially malignant tissues.

The workshop concluded with some information about career pathways into medicine and other lesser-known science-based roles within the NHS, such as Microbiology and Biochemistry.

Our Year 10 and 12 students really did us proud with their biological knowledge, enthusiasm and practical skills, all students managing to produce visible tissues! Our visitors were suitably impressed and gave our students excellent feedback.

Thank you to all involved in the day; the students for applying their knowledge and working so hard; Wellington science staff, particularly Dr Lane, Miss Flett and Mr Brownbill and Emma Lee, Biomedical Scientist at Manchester Royal Infirmary who helped put together many aspects of the session before the day. Year 13 Biology Field Trip

With the weather looking a little foreboding, we set off on a Monday morning back in October for the annual Year 13 A-Level Biology field trip to FSC Castle Head in Grange-over-Sands.

With luck though, the weather held for the first two days and the waterproofs were only required on the final day.

The Year 13 biologists spent the next three days learning and performing many ecological sampling techniques in wonderfully scenic surroundings and using their new skills to complete two of the A-Level required practicals.

The techniques they practised included methods of sampling and studying both motile and non-motile organisms. Random sampling using quadrats and grids along with systematic sampling using belt transects were both employed to study the plants and fungi in the grounds around the site. To investigate the nocturnal wildlife, students used electronic bat detectors to listen to the ultrasonic sounds which the bats use to locate their prev in the darkness. Camera traps were placed in the

woodland which caught a badger foraging for food in the leaf litter. Small mammal traps were placed by students in locations which they thought may be home to small rodents, which turned out to be very productive trapping both wood mice and field voles. Students also sampled aquatic organisms and were surprised by the diversity of different organisms and how big some of them werel

The students conducted themselves excellently making brilliant ambassadors for the school, the centre staff commented on how efficient Wellington pupils were at designing their own investigations and gathering their data. Mr Brownbill & Mrs Hoogenberg

Science Club

This year our Science Clubbers have been keener than ever!

Our Year 7 and 8 students have been attending every Wednesday at lunchtime and have taken part in various themed activities throughout the year. At Halloween we explored spooky scenes with Chemistry, the students formed reactions with gaseous products to go with their beautiful displays of ghosts and pumpkins! At Christmas we discussed the Science behind the gunpowder that gives us the 'crack' in our crackers and made some cracker designs of our own. We are also trying to




STEM Day



Careers

The careers provision at Wellington has been enhanced this year by the adoption of the Unifrog careers platform. All students have received workshops on how to create their online



account and get the best out of this 'one-stop-careersshop'. Students are actively using Unifrog to search for college and university places, research careers, take personality tests and build their CVs. Our Skills for Life programme, which is delivered during tutor time, focuses on careers education through all key stages and as well as this, students have enjoyed a host of personalised and bespoke experiences throughout the year. In January, Years 11-13 benefitted from a seminar on Apprenticeships and in February Year 9 attended a week of special assemblies geared towards preparing them for their KS4 option choices – local employers were joined by staff from The Manchester College and Trafford College to outline potential pathways and opportunities after students have completed their GCSEs.

Perhaps our largest event of the year took place in October as we welcomed businesses and colleges to our careers fair. Year 11 students and sixth formers spent the day at a range of workshops before visiting 34 stalls which had been erected in the Adshead Hall. A wide range of industries such as hospitality, healthcare, education, sport & leisure and finance were represented.

Back in December we welcomed the BBC as part of their Share Your Story centenary celebration. Years 7-10 were treated to a talk from CBBC and Strictly runner-up Rhys Stephenson about his career in front of the camera as well as the opportunities which exist behind the camera within the broadcasting and wider media industries.

Year 10 learned how to complete an application form in preparation for their practice interviews which took place in April. We were lucky enough to welcome over fifty employers from companies as diverse as Sellafield, KPMG, Barclays and Microsoft who put our students under just the right amount of pressure on the big day!

As well as in-school opportunities, we have also run a large number of off-site visits to Universities, colleges and businesses this year. The National Apprenticeship Show at Bolton Arena and The UK Higher Education Exhibition at Old Trafford kept a few hundred older students busy while smaller, targeted groups of younger students enjoyed visits to UA92 for the Cyber Girls conference led by Microsoft and to EY at their Manchester headquarters.

In addition to all of the above, however, the strength of our careers programme lies within the delivery of our curriculum. Visiting speakers and school trips, and lunchtime clubs and activities, invariably open students to new experiences and ideas beyond the classroom. We are always happy to hear from parents and members of the wider community who are able to enhance our careers provision in whatever ways they can!

Duke of Edinburgh Award

2022/3 has been an incredibly busy year with Wellington's delivery of the Duke of Edinburgh's award scheme. Interest in the scheme continues to grow to record levels and we have been working hard, with the DofE, to 'mop up' the complications that followed Covid 19. This affected so many of our students over recent years but I'm pleased to say we are getting there!

We have had our own expedition kit for several years now but this year we have been adding to our inventory. Increasing the number of staff tents, upgrading our compasses and obtaining large refillable water bottles so we can remove single use plastic from our expedition drinking water supplies are some recent additions. Another initiative has been to introduce group colour coded rucksack covers. These proved to be a massive success adding yet a further level of safety and control. Wellington has also invested in a large quantity of rucksacks and now offer these for rent to those who do not immediately want to invest in this expensive piece of kit. Many of our rucksacks are 'slim Jim' size which offer a better fit for most of our participants than the standard sizes usually supplied.

The expedition action started when 37 of our Year 11 students went on their Silver assessed expedition over the last few days of September. This is very unusual but was necessary because their DofE stalled when their Bronze expedition was curtailed at the last minute due to Government lock-down. Miss Challinor had worked tirelessly to try to squeeze this expedition in before she commenced her maternity leave but ultimately this proved impossible. The team here at Wellington rallied round and delivered the expedition at this more challenging time of the year. It was unusual for our Silver expedition to take place in the Rivington area but to meet the standards we went a little longer, higher and wilder than we typically do. To add further to the challenge, we stayed at a 'pop up' campsite that, whilst not quite wild camping, came pretty close. I remember Miss Challinor messaging us on her due date to check 'all the participants were having the best possible time'. Not only were they having a great time but they were also making their way through a significant quantity of toasted marshmallow having watched the sun set over their very own lake!

Soon after we returned we launched our new Bronze season. This commenced with two open evenings and interest was incredible. As a result, a record 173 students have just completed their Bronze expeditions after extensive training and practising their navigation skills using the orienteering facilities in Wythenshawe Park. For reasons of safety and to limit the impact on the local community in the expedition area we decided we needed to split this cohort in two. As a result, staff ran two practice walks, nine training sessions and two assessed expeditions for the first time ever.

At the time of writing this our Bronze expeditions have just been completed and we are now busy getting ready for this year's Silver expeditions. We have 41 participants signed up and working on their Silver sections. Expedition training has begun in preparation for the practice expedition which will take place in the Ashworth Valley during the last week of the school year. During the first week back in September the same participants will be assessed on expedition in the Hope Valley.

When they return we will go straight into launching next year's Bronze season but somewhere in between we are working hard to squeeze in an award ceremony when we will present the certificates and badges to all those who have completed their awards and have waited so long. More on these arrangements will follow soon. Internal delivery of DofE at Wellington is an epic undertaking. This is only possible because of the sheer dedication to the cause of my colleagues and our senior leaders. The 30 colleagues involved this year all do this as volunteers so a massive thank you to them all. Extra special thanks must go to Dr Lane who has been absolutely key to the success of this year's delivery. Thanks also to Mr Ashfield who is our qualified expedition assessor and continues to deliver this crucial role. Mr Fenwick also joins the DofE team behind the scenes as our award verifier after successfully completing the necessary training.

Thanks also to our partners GRIP Adventure and Sam Sykes Ltd who help us deliver our Silver expeditions. Thanks also to our colleagues in Bolton Mountain Rescue Team some of whom joined us on expedition to sample Wellington Staff camp hospitality.

Most of all thank you to you all for your support. Those kind emails and particularly the ones confirming your charges had had a great time on expedition, despite the challenge, make it all worthwhile.

A massive well done to all our participants on Bronze and Silver awards. Without exception you did yourselves and Wellington School proud so keep it up.

DofE is simply about personal challenge and is accessible to everyone. You do not need to cover a certain distance, be first back to camp or be a perfect navigator. As long as you are challenged and you step up to that challenge then we and you have done our jobs. Those who found the challenge the most difficult will get the most out of the experience so once the aching stops and the blisters heal always remember how you did it on expedition. Remember how close you got to giving up and crucially how you found the resilience to carry on. This is a life skill that will stick with you forever. Remember it and use it again and again.

Another busy year for the 6th Form!

July saw our Year 12 Review and Reward Day. We spent the morning reflecting on the past year and planning for the next, from the position of the halfway point. Mr Cropper led some sessions on Personal Learning Checklists, university applications, UCAS personal statements and student finance. We also welcomed a guest speaker from the NHS to deliver a workshop on physical, sexual and personal health care. The day was topped off with a traditional sports day on the field - very entertaining three-legged, wheelbarrow, egg and spoon and sack races. We also had some sprinting (including a staff 100m dash!) and a tutor team relay. Students enjoyed the opportunity to relax in the sunshine and the events themselves caused much hilarity. Mr Terry's ice cream van also turned up to take the edge off the sweltering heat and we were all treated to 99s with sprinkles!

In September, all of our new Year 12s and the Sixth Form team boarded the coach for Leeds where we spent the day at Leeds Beckett University. Students took part in a carousel of activities including presentations from university staff and undergraduate ambassadors on the topics of 'Choosing a Course and Choosing a University', 'Student Life' and 'Finance & Budgeting' (the weekly budget task was eye opening for many when asked to guesstimate their average weekly spend on food and bills!) They also completed a team building challenge to see who could build the longest bridge from minimal resources (paper, juice cartons and paper clips no less). Not only did the bridge have to be as long as possible but also had to meet a specific height and had to be able to support a roll of Sellotape. Needless to say, there were a number of collapsing bridges! Students worked brilliantly together and it was great to hear the discussions, laughter and competitive spirit. Over lunch, we were treated to a delicious meal in one of the campus refectories and students were then sent off in teams to dash about campus in an orienteering style tour - they were asked to take selfies at various checkpoints including the campus letter box which took some finding! A hugely enjoyable day. Leeds Beckett staff and students were really welcoming and we loved seeing the more historic parts of the campus as well as the new £45 million sports facility; it was stunning. State of the art lecture theatres, fitness suites, physio treatment rooms and sports nutrition kitchens - all very impressive. Even though our Year 125 were just at the start of their A Level journey, the aim of the day was to whet

their appetite and encourage them to start thinking about what their exciting next steps might be post-18. We also wanted them to enjoy getting to know one another and the staff in a more relaxed setting away from Sixth Form. We think the day achieved just that.

Also in September, the Sixth Form held their own coffee morning event and raised a wonderful £147.89 for 'Macmillan'. It was fantastic to see so many delicious treats baked by our 6th Formers and so many students wearing green to show their support. Thank you to everyone for their participation and generosity. There was a lovely atmosphere in the common room (and that wasn't just down to the delightful aroma of chocolate). Special thanks must go to all our star bakers for their contributions and the Year 13 team who helped to plan and co-ordinate the event (Katie T, Abi H, Abi C and Ria K). A huge 'well done'!

Curriculum Enrichment continued this year with a chance to have a weekly unwind from the academic and join a range of activities offered including the gym, sport, enterprise and work placement. The students love the opportunity to use their gym membership and the work placement has helped those who want to enter teaching, medicine or veterinary science get the experience they need for applying for university courses. The Extended Project Qualification also runs as part of the Curriculum Enrichment programme. This is a qualification like no other at A Level and demands a high level of independence and self-motivation. Students are tasked with devising a question on a topic area of their choosing, researching their chosen topic and writing a 5,000-word essay/producing an artefact to answer their question. Topic choices were as diverse as ever including machine learning technology, the fungal genus Ophiocordyceps, Meghan Markle's representation in the British tabloid press, image recognition neural networks and NHS physiotherapy treatments for stroke patients. Along the way, students are responsible for selecting appropriate and reliable books, journals and other sources of information, editing, re-drafting and referencing. All this under the watchful eye of a staff supervisor to guide and support but, ultimately, the student is in charge. Students are also required to keep a detailed 'Production Log' which outlines their EPQ journey - pitfalls, obstacles, successes and all. The course concludes with our students' presentations to an audience of fellow students and staff. Every single one of the students should feel very proud of their efforts.





On Tuesday, 9th November all Year 12 attended the Greater Manchester 'Safe Drive Stav Alive' event at The Middleton Arena. This project was launched by the emergency services in an effort to reduce the number of young people killed and seriously injured on our roads. Their aim is to raise road safety awareness among young people and give them a hard-hitting insight into the dangers of driving. The performance lasted 90 minutes during which time the students watched a series of short films tracing the events leading up to a crash and then following the actions of the emergency services dealing with the incident. The films were interspersed at appropriate moments by police, ambulance, fire and rescue and accident and emergency staff speaking about their real life experiences at the scene of a collision. Volunteer members of the public also took to the stage to recount personal stories about how their lives had been affected by a fatal or serious collision. A sombre and thought-provoking morning but extremely worthwhile and important for all young drivers and responsible passengers. Year 12 were unanimous in their praise of the event. Students were invited to complete pre- and post-event questionnaires. They were also asked to make a driving 'pledge' on Instagram and Twitter in light of their experience at SDSA. All the pledges were put into a prize draw and, amazingly, one of our students, Zoe T, was the lucky winner. She received £350 of Apple vouchers presented to her in school by the event organiser, Ros Hopkins.

December saw our (now annual) Staff & Sixth Form Christmas Jumper Day. Once more, staff and Sixth Formers did us proud in their festive/sparkly/woolly knits. We also had a Christmas pudding bobble hat, light-up earrings and a Christmas tree tie! We raised over £200 for 'Cash for Kids: Mission Christmas' (£200.83 to be exact in terms of donations to school but we're also aware that lots of people made donations directly to the charity via the website). We were very grateful for everyone's donations to a really amazing cause.

In what has become another annual December event, Miss Grey and a group of Sixth Formers coordinated a collection for the Trussell Trust Foodbank. The students were organised and thorough in their planning and overseeing of the collection. As always, the generosity of our Wellington community amazed us and we had a van full of goods to deliver. Huge thanks to Mr Woolley from our team of site staff who helped with the delivery and to all the parents and students who donated.

Our fundraising highlight is always the Sponsored Walk and this year was no exception! Having missed it dreadfully for the last couple of years, the 3rd March saw the Sixth Form pull out all the stops with their incredible fancy dress costumes. We had super heroes, birds, nuns, the Mario brothers and workmen in hard hats and hivis jackets walking the length and breadth of Timperley's streets with collection buckets, making a sizeable contribution to the grand total.

Next steps are never far from our thoughts as the 2 years in Sixth Form always fly by and we know what a crucial stepping stone A Levels are for higher level study/ employment. March was a busy month for our Year 12 students who attended the UCAS Higher Education Exhibition at Manchester Central and the UK University & Apprenticeship Search Fair at Old Trafford. This year we had access to Unifrog to help with post-18 opportunities and it has proven to be an excellent tool to help students make some critical decisions about their post-Sixth Form pathway.

This year we also launched our Curriculum for Life (C4L) programme in the extended tutor period on Tuesday mornings. This scheme of work gives students a broad range of life skills and understanding of issues beyond the academic curriculum. Key topics have included Eating well, Finance, Healthy relationships and Mental Health. Students also engage in tutor group discussions on current affairs on Thursdays and we have the much anticipated quiz to end each week on Fridays. The league table is the subject of much scrutiny in a bid to come top of the table!

So, what else has been going on? We have a range of mentors who work with lower school students in the LRC engaging in homework support. A large number of our students are wellbeing ambassadors, anti-bullying ambassadors or anti-racism ambassadors. Attendance

FFT Education collects daily attendance data from over 10,500 schools in England. This data helps schools track, monitor and compare their attendance against the Regional and National picture.

In January 2023 our school received an attendance award from the FFT Data Lab for our Autumn Term attendance.

Wellington School were in the top 10% of all the Schools on their database (10,500 Schools).

This excellent achievement continued into the Spring Term with our school attendance consistently being above the National Average. Unfortunately, no

awards have been issued for Spring attendance due to the teacher strike days impacting schools differently. However, our above National Average attendance achievement remains the same.

KEY STAGE 3 News

Key Stage 3

We continue to be impressed with the personal and academic development of our Key Stage 3 students.

We have developed a very bespoke tutor programme that involves tackling different issues surrounding 'period poverty', 'changes in society with the use of pronouns', 'inappropriate colloquialisms' and 'toxic masculinity'. These have been covered alongside 'how to keep safe online', 'what leadership looks like', 'am I a resilient learner?', 'how to revise', 'acts of kindness' and 'how to show my initiative in situations'.

Our vertical assemblies (mixed year groups) continue to be a driving force in establishing a solid community built on honesty and fairness whilst rewarding our endeavour in lessons. We have covered

topics such as 'what is outstanding?', 'usual emotions in adversity', 'acceptance in society', as well as many topics surrounding resilience, motivation and being yourself.

Currently, our Key Stage 3 cohort are behaving at a 95% positive behaviour ratio. This is just extraordinary and the students never fail to amaze me with their attitude and effort towards their lessons. We have raised our badge thresholds this year to challenge our young people. At the time of writing 62% of our Key Stage 3 students have achieved their bronze badge already this year, with 27% having gone past the silver threshold already and two of our students have surpassed gold already. With more badges due out over the next few weeks this figure is sure to rise quite dramatically.

Also, this year a small number of Key Stage 3 students have completed a Scholars programme with our local university. It involves students firstly getting a taste of what life is like at university. Secondly, the students worked through a topic and developed their study skills and essay writing to apply this knowledge into their school learning.

We are looking for our Key Stage 3 students to take opportunities when they arise and try to push themselves out of their comfort zone. Life is sometimes difficult but as a team we will deal with those testing times and look how to move forward.

Year 10

Taking over the year group as they start their Key Stage 4 journey has shown me the level of resilience the pupils have. They have had a very disjointed Key Stage 3, due to the pandemic, but they have demonstrated an ability to adapt in such a short time frame signifying maturity beyond their years.

I am proud of the way they have conducted themselves this year with what is a very challenging and demanding one on top of them starting their GCSE's. We have had guest speakers in school to discuss community issues such as knife crime. The level of engagement through these events, the questions being raised and the appreciation afterwards just again demonstrates the maturity within the year group.

We have had a revamped morning period on a Tuesday called 'Curriculum 4 Life'. This aims to bring awareness and education to cultural topics such as vaping or relationships. The feedback from tutors, as well as observations from the KS4 team, has been very positive.

More recently, the pupils have undergone a very successful set of practice interviews. We ask industries to come in to school and provide an interview scenario for our pupils. This again was highlighted by not only the attendance but the level of money raised during the school's annual sponsored walk. The behaviour on that day too was impeccable.

With Year 11 fast approaching the pupils have been working diligently in class and morning registration time has been dedicated to support their revision. The pupils have been working through revision techniques and have lessons focussed on 'how to revise'. These sessions have supported the pupils with their preparation for the recent mock exams. Our Key Stage ethos is 'Attitude is Everything'. This truly was the case during these exams. The behaviour, punctuality, level of preparation, focus etc. shown by the pupils was amazing.


We are both very proud of our year group and the culture we are trying to create. We are looking forward to what Year 11 brings.

Recently, they were given another taste of an intense mock examination period. It was a sample of what will take place for real in their GCSE examinations. Many of the students coped very well with the 2nd mock exams and should be proud of the effort they put into them - well done!

In addition, to make it as close to the real thing as possible, the year group have also experienced a 'results day' style morning where teachers made an honest prediction about pupils' GCSEs based upon present performance and work rate. This again gave the students another flavour of what is to come in the summer.

We have been working hard all year to provide the pupils with the necessary skills to succeed in their upcoming GCSEs. The students have just completed a very successful Easter school fortnight which saw a record number of pupils attend. Researcher Programme

Caddens are lucky enough to be involved with this once in a lifetime research programme at such a young age.

#BeeWell is a programme led by the University of Manchester, the Greater Manchester Combined Authority and the Anna Freud Centre that seeks to measure young people's wellbeing and, in collaboration with schools and partner organisations, deliver positive change as a result. The #BeeWell survey will help to embed long-term improvements in wellbeing by finding the right way to support young people's wellbeing across Greater Manchester.

The Young Researchers Programme is a five-part course that introduced Year 10 pupils to the world of academic research, with a focus on wellbeing. The course introduced pupils to key concepts and equipped them with basic skills in measurement and statistical analysis. The course also gave pupils the opportunity to get hands on with the #BeeWell data analysis interrogating the results and shaping future research carried out by the University of Manchester team.

The sessions took part out of school hours, so this really is a testament to their commitment, not only to Psychology but the greater good of the cause. I am super proud. The future of Psychology and the Wellbeing of our Wellington Community is most certainly in good hands.

Within the School our children with Special Educational Needs have had many exciting opportunities. As we strive to be an inclusive school most of the opportunities are encompassed within the whole school learning environment. However please see below some of the exciting things we have been doing as a department.

The HUBS

Over the summer HUB1 had some extensive work to enlarge the room and make it a flexible space for independent learning and some sensory spaces.

HUB2 has developed its own sensory space also to allow children to regulate their emotions, this includes the use of an exercise bike in which children can obtain some sensory feedback to allow them to regulate.

Each HUB has a HUB Manager who will work with the children to identify barriers to their learning and enable them to reintegrate back into mainstream lessons.

Breakfast/Homework Club

We have managed to get Breakfast Club and Homework Club back to normality. Students attend the clubs if they are struggling to complete their homework independently or if they need to engage in some social communication intervention in the mornings.

The children are greeted by the very enthusiastic TA team in the morning and the evening. This provision is extremely beneficial to our students and without the commitment of the TAs we would not be able to offer this wonderful provision.

SPLD

We have enhanced the role of our SPLD specialist Mrs Soldiew to enable her to work with more children during the school day.

Mrs Soldiew works tirelessly to support our young people who may be struggling with their literacy skills. Mrs Soldiew works with the students to identify barriers and create their own strategies to support.

AIS Project

The school is proud to be part of the pilot scheme of Autism in Schools Project.

The project gives the School 10 hours of school training to ensure that we are meeting the needs of our autistic young people. The project also offers the same training to parents and we have enjoyed these training sessions and we can see some of the good practice being shared around the school.

Reading Groups



The Teaching Assistants have been working hard to help children

develop a love for reading within the reading groups.

Each Teaching Assistant has a group of students who attend 2 weekly sessions to develop their reading accuracy and reading comprehension. The children enjoy their sessions but I am sure that the juice and biscuits help with their engagement.

The HIVE opened up in September 2022. We are a small specialist support class offering support to pupils with a diagnosis of Autism and other additional needs. Pupils in the HIVE access a blended timetable, which includes core subjects in the mainstream and preparing for adulthood skills within the HIVE.

Mini Enterprise

The pupils in the HIVE take part in a weekly mini enterprise session. This involves us creating new ideas each term to sell to staff and pupils. Items made have included sweet treats and ornaments, all designed by the pupils. We have raised over £185 over the course of the year for a range of charities including CAFT (Children's Adventure Farm Trust) and Papyrus. Well done to all pupils involved and thank you to the staff, pupils and parents who have attended our markets.

Guinea Pigs

We now have 3 furry friends in the HIVE! Meet Bumble, Rascal and Smudge. These have been a wonderful addition to the HIVE and pupils are involved in feeding, cleaning and caring for them which supports our ethos of preparing for adulthood. Special thanks to Neve Rawden who is dedicated to caring for the Guinea Pigs and cleans them out every week, well done!

In the summer term, pupils have been accessing the local shops to buy food for the HIVE. The staff are incredibly impressed by the pupil's road safety and impeccable manners with the public.
